We followed along with Bob Ross episodes that were airing on Prime, and it reignited my long-held love for painting. While I had always been drawn to art, I never had the time to fully pursue it. After just a couple of Bob Ross-inspired paintings, I was off to the races, diving headfirst into honing my skills with relentless passion."

What types of paintings do you enjoy creating the most?

"Right now, I'm focused on my first portfolio, Earth and Sky. I've completed around 12 paintings in this collection, with only five still available—three of which are currently exhibited at the Art Gallery of Golden until the end of April. While I love painting landscapes and stormscapes, I don't want to be confined to just one subject. I enjoy exploring different styles and subjects, and I have plans for many more abstracted and unique pieces in the future."

Your work often captures the beauty of nature—mountains, wildlife, and serene landscapes. What inspired you to shift gears and paint Porsches?

"To be honest, these two paintings (cover & background here) started as gifts for my teenage boys—after all, what teenage boy doesn't love a shiny sports car? Beyond that, there's also a sentimental connection. Years ago, my dad had a photo of a Porsche 911 on our refrigerator. It was a dream of his to one day buy one for me, so painting these pieces felt like a special way to honor that memory."

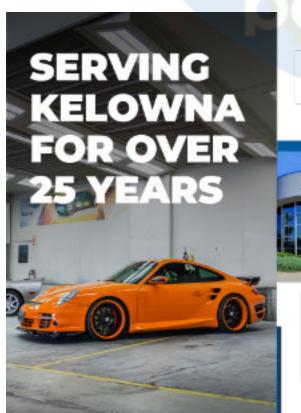

PORSCHE CARRERA GT MAJOR SERVICE

WHAT OWNERS NEED TO KNOW

The Porsche Carrera GT is one of the most revered analog supercars ever created. With only 1,270 units produced between 2004 and 2007, this mid-engine marvel demands meticulous maintenance to preserve its performance and value. The major service interval for a Carrera GT isn't just recommended—it's essential for the longevity of this motorsport-derived engineering masterpiece.



Understanding the Major Service Interval

Unlike modern Porsche models maintenance reminders, the Carrera GT requires proactive service scheduling. Porsche officially recommends a major service every four years or 48,000 km, whichever comes first. This particular example we are currently servicing & repairing was not due to a lack of service, but more likely due to a lack of use, requiring this vehicle to be towed into Motor Werke. It was a no-start concern, which necessitated some testing to rule out the basics, i.e. battery, power supply to ignition and fuel injectors, and verification of several other components that can affect a successful start-up.

An in-depth analysis of the wiring circuits to the fuel pumps was conducted using the factory Porsche POSES information system. It was determined that the pumps were not getting proper power and ground, and would require replacement. The pumps have been known to fail on the Carrera GT cars with time, and the fact that they often sit for extended periods with stale fuel in the tank certainly does not help the situation.







WHAT'S INCLUDED IN A CARRERA GT MAJOR SERVICE AT MOTOR WERKE:

The comprehensive major service for a Carrera GT involves several critical procedures:

Engine and Drivetrain

The centerpiece of any Carrera GT service is attention to its 5.7-liter V10 engine. Technicians will perform a complete oil service using specialized high-performance synthetic Porsche oil, replace all filters, drive belt, and spark plugs, check valve clearances and verify if wear on cam lobes is present—a known wear item. The engine and gearbox are removed from the car. The ceramic clutch assembly particular attention because requires represents one of the most challenging aspects of Carrera GT ownership. Checking the current wear on the clutch can be done without removing the gearbox from the engine. Porsche engineers have always been great at considering servicing and component accessibility when engineering and designing their sports cars.

Suspension and Chassis

The carbon fiber monocoque chassis and pushrod suspension system demand close inspection. Technicians will examine the carbon ceramic brakes for wear and proper operation, check suspension components for degradation, and ensure all bushings provide adequate compliance. The vehicle's ride height and alignment are also verified to factory specifications. This vehicle showed leaks at the damper seals, which were recommended for replacement. We will be upgrading the factory suspension system to a hydraulic lift system that will provide two inches of added clearance and improve the overall driving experience and access to areas that would have posed a threat of damage to the carbon underbody panels.

Damage Inspection and Cleaning Preparation

At Motor Werke, we clean cars often, before and after a service, and sometimes during the project if it is with us for a prolonged time. The cleaning process allows for an accurate inspection to verify details beyond the mechanical workings of the car, ensuring that we present all options to maintain the vehicle's value throughout all aspects of the exterior and interior of the vehicle. In this case, damage was identified during the initial inspection and repaired. We worked closely with Robert's Composites in North Vancouver to rebuild the underbody panels and carbon weave, damaged during a trip from Calgary over the mountain passes to the Okanagan. A rock found its way under the car and impacted the front and mid-section carbon panels, affecting the resin finish and the carbon weave in several areas. Robert and his team in North Vancouver were able to refinish both panels and the rear diffuser to a 'better than new' condition. They used a modern-day resin with a clear protective finish to replace the original, which showed a 'yellowing effect'. This inevitably occurs with the factory panels over time, on the Carrera GT since production. A big thank you to Roberts Composites for the hard work they put into the panels for us, and to Ron and his team for enclosed and safe transport.

Cost Expectations

Ownership of an automotive icon like the Carrera GT comes with commensurate maintenance costs. A major service typically varies significantly, based on the individual needs of the car at the time of inspection, the condition, the total kilometers driven, time-based service that may be overdue, and potential mechanical and aesthetic improvements to the vehicle. An authorized Porsche center or specialist workshop will help navigate all the nuances of service for the Carrera GT. While the total investment for servicing may seem substantial, it represents only a fraction of the vehicle's current market value, which often exceeds 2 million \$CDN.

Selecting The Service Provider

While Porsche Classic Centers offer factory-trained technicians and original parts, several independent specialists have developed exceptional reputations for Carrera GT maintenance.



One of the foremost leaders in Porsche GT car service, repair, and expert advice is Repasi Motorwerks USA. Motor Werke has had the privilege of working directly with Jimmy and his team at Repasi. As the lead provider for Carrera GT owners, Repasi Motorwerks combines specialized knowledge with the dedicated attention to detail these rare supercars demand. When our team was searching for the best parts, information and overall support options, Motor Werke found Repasi through our network of industry professionals. Repasi has documented experience specifically with the Carrera GT, with its unique carbon fiber construction and specialized systems, far beyond standard Porsche models. Motor Werke's technicians undergo continuous training to stay current with the latest maintenance protocols for many extraordinary vehicles, and do our best to seek partnerships and relationships with other industry experts to provide the customer with the best outcome for the investment they make for vehicles such as the Porsche Carrera GT. Thank you to Kulu Punia at Kulu MotorCar, Calgary, for your continued support over the years, . Providing the connection to Jimmy at Repasi has been invaluable for us.



Exploring Your Options and Research

Beyond maintaining performance, regular major service directly impacts long-term value retention. Documented service history from reputable providers significantly enhances resale value and marketability. In the collector car market, the difference between a Carrera GT with complete service documentation and another with gaps in its maintenance history, can easily exceed \$250,000. We were fortunate enough to know Kulu and get the full history for the car since he sold it to the current owner. We cross-referenced all recommendations and service intervals with what we knew had been completed on the vehicle, to prevent any redundancy maintenance. As an example, the clutch had been replaced, and upon measurement, we were able to verify that there was well over 50% life remaining on it. Our connection with the Repasi Motorwerks team, which also a benefit to the owner. Fuel pumps are not available from Porsche; the only option is to replace the entire tank, which is a beautifully crafted and welded section-by-section structure of aluminum with an octopus of lines and wiring spanning across both sides of the tank. The cost was exceeding \$40,000 CDN\$ for this part of the project. After several calls, weeks of research being done whilst other parts were being sourced directly from Porsche Classic, and emails to our contacts

Germany and the USA, the team at Repasi assured us that they would be willing to help. Rather than a complete replacement of the fuel tank through Porsche Classic, or going through the cumbersome process of shipping the tank to the eastern USA at the Repasi workshop for rebuild, they agreed to send us the internal rebuild kit for the tank. This significantly reduced the cost and wait-time had we required Porsche AG to build a tank, which was a made to order item expected to take months to deliver. This option really was a turning point for us in the repair process for the fuel tank issue. The net result was significant savings of both time and money. Thank you!

Conclusion

The Porsche Carrera GT represents the pinnacle of analog supercar engineering—a last and ultimate hurrah for Porsche aficionados and car nerds across the globe before the era of electronic driver aids and hybridization. Proper maintenance through regular major services isn't merely about keeping this automotive masterpiece running; it's about preserving an important piece of automotive history. For the fortunate few who own these remarkable machines, adhering to stringent service protocols ensures their investment remains both mechanically sound and financially prudent.

We are honoured and humbled to be involved in this project & process of being the caretakers of this CGT. We will be holding a limited-invite tech session at Motor Werke for our Porsche customers and friends in our community, which will be a fun way to learn more about the Carrera GT and enjoy some co-

nversations, refreshments and snacks with other likeminded Porsche fanatics.

A big extension of gratitude goes out to Braeden, Derek and Tim for the countless hours here at Motor Werke that they have poured into this car.

Expert Tips for a Proper Porsche Spring Clean-Up

As winter fades and spring emerges, your Porsche deserves a fresh start—whether it's been driven through the season or stored safely indoors. Even if your car hasn't faced harsh winter roads, it still accumulates dust, dirt, and unseen contaminants that can affect its appearance and longevity. A thorough spring detailing is essential for preserving your vehicle's aesthetics, protecting surfaces, and maintaining its value. Here's why it matters and how to do it right.

Why Spring Detailing is Essential

1. Remove Harmful Road Salt and Grime

While Okanagan roads may not see excessive salt use, road debris and contaminants still build up over time, leading to potential corrosion—especially on undercarriages and wheel wells. If you haven't been washing your car regularly, a **Decontamination Wash** is necessary to safely remove embedded metals and grime from your paint.

2. Protect Paint and Surfaces

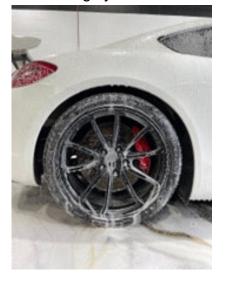
Neglecting a proper wash allows dirt and debris to create **micro-scratches**, dulling your vehicle's finish over time. A thorough wash followed by waxing or sealing restores shine and shields against UV damage. For long-term protection, consider a **ceramic coating**, which enhances gloss and makes future maintenance easier.

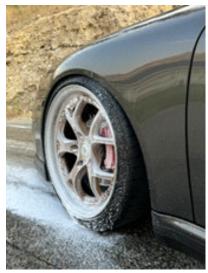
Step-by-Step Guide to a Perfect Spring Clean-Up

1. Clean the Wheels First

Always start with the wheels to avoid splashing dirt onto a freshly washed exterior. Use wheel brushes, mitts, and Wheel Woolies to scrub thoroughly.







2. Pre-Rinse and Foam

- Rinse the entire car from **top to bottom**, including wheel wells, door seams, and other dirt-prone areas.
- Apply a layer of **thick foam** using a foam lance to break down grime before physically touching the paint.





3. Wash the Vehicle Properly

- No Rinse Method: I highly recommend Optimum No Rinse Wash & Shine or P&S Absolute, allowing for an efficient, eco-friendly clean without excessive water usage.
- **Traditional Soap Method:** If using a soap-based wash, remember to do an extra rinse to remove suds completely.
- Wash from **top to bottom**, starting with the roof, then working down to the front bumper, sides, and rear (which typically holds the most grime).





4. Decontamination Process (When Needed)

Once the initial wash is done, follow up with a **decontamination step** to remove embedded contaminants like iron particles and stubborn grime, ensuring a smooth paint surface.

5. Drying the Vehicle

- Use a **high-quality microfiber drying towel** (such as those from The Rag Company) to prevent streaking.
- Before drying, apply a **paint sealant** like **Optimum Opti-Seal or Hyper Seal** to a wet surface—this protects the paint while making drying easier.
- Use separate microfibers for door seams, trims, engine compartments, and wheels to avoid cross-contamination.



6. Paint Protection: Wax or Sealant

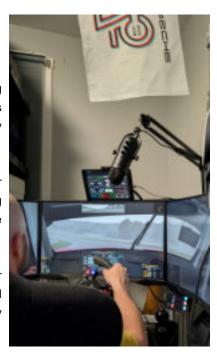
My Journey with PCA Sim Racing

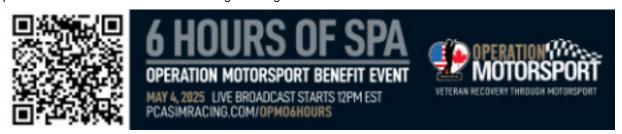

Is your Spouse/Partner or Children allowed to drive your ride and if so how often?

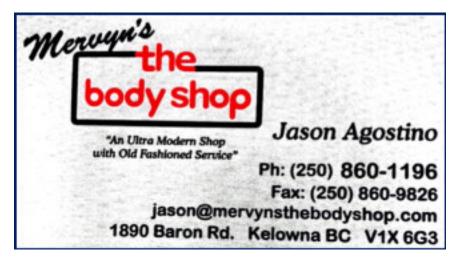
"Allowed, yes but spouse won't because she's afraid she'll break it, son is too tall to fit in it, and my daughter isn't interested. "

The University of British Columbia, Okanagan campus (UBCO) had a call out for volunteers in September 2024, supporting the School of Engineering ENTREPRENEURIAL CAPSTONE PROJECT. They were looking for volunteers to help the School of Engineering 4th year capstone program instructed by Dr. Kenneth Chau and Dr. Alon Eisenstein (fellow member) for student led teams, as part of an Entrepreneurial Capstone Project. They were looking for approximately 18 volunteers whom would be willing to give 5 hours of their time from October 2024 – April 2025 in supporting the program though an entrepreneurial/"client" membership lens. I was fortunate enough to be asked, chosen and participate.

In this project, students who participate in their final years' engineering design capstone project course are mentored by entrepreneurs from the campus incubator program and learn to apply engineering, design skills to solve real world problems and address market needs in their community.

The goals of the project are:

- 1. Increase students' engagement in the capstone project by pursuing their own initiated project ideas.
- 2. Increase the quality of student-led projects through the affordance of financial support, mentorship, and supplemental training.
- 3. Enhance students' reflections of their experience through facilitated virtual oral reflection.

What is the CAPSTONE?

- 1. Capstone is the culminating engineering design experience for undergraduate engineering students in their fourth year of the program. This is a course that runs from September to April during which students work to solve engineering problems, ending in a showcase and completion (which has been held at the KF Centre for Excellence in the past couple of years).
- 2. The course is designed to allow students to use knowledge gained from engineering courses taken through out their program, including those in design and engineering communication, to successfully conduct self-guided engineering design for a specific project of their choice with the assistance of a faculty advisor. The Team I was assigned to assist mentor was a bright group of race car enthusiasts all of whom have forged a relationship with Okanagan Motorsports and have been part of them for a number of years.

What is OK Motorsports?

OK Motorsports is the University of British Columbia Okanagan's' Formula SAE team (FSAE- or Formula Society of Automotive Engineers) It is an international collegiate engineering competition where student teams design, build and race small-scale Formula-style race cars. Teams are evaluated on Design, Cost, and Business case. In addition to the performance of their vehicle, it is also evaluated based on acceleration, efficicency and general handling. Established in 2013, OK Motorsports develop IC and EV race cars. They have been busy developing their first EV race car for the annual 2025 competition. The team consists of more than 100 active student members from a wide range of disciplines at the UBCO campus. They design a formula-style race car to the technical regulations laid out each year by Formula SAE's 130+ page competition rule book. Then they set out to build the car! This provides hands-on learning for all team members through manufacturing, assembly, and testing



procedures. Next they showcase their work, both technical and managerial, by competing at international Formula SAE competitions against other universities from across the continent and around the world.

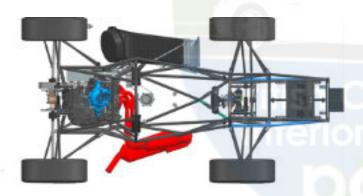


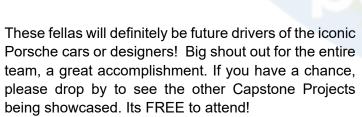


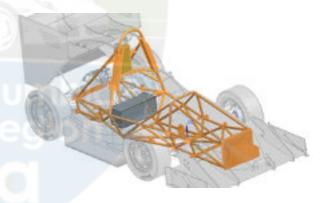

CAPSTONE PROJECT

Automotive design is an engineering field deeply rooted in cutting-edge technology, where each year brings new and innovative techniques to improve upon what was previously mundane, especially for performance-oriented cars. It involves deep knowledge of fluid mechanics, mechanics of materials, digital control, and many more fields put together to create something both elegant and fast. Next-generation automotive engineers are hard at work learning many of these skills through their undergraduate degrees, but also through applicative projects such as the local Formula SAE (FSAE) group at UBC in Kelowna. This university club builds small open-wheelbase race cars to bring to competitions, using a combination of bespoke and catalogue parts. Speaking from experience, seeing a car you helped work on and design scream around a track is a feeling I will never forget.

A few friends and I have decided to take things one step further and combine our undergrads with the club through a Capstone design project. This project is considered the pinnacle of your undergrad degree, applying the knowledge acquired through school to solve a real-world problem. For us, we are modifying the engine head of a 2007 CBR600RR racing bike engine to better suit it for the car.

More specifically, we are changing the ports of the engine head (the passages where intake air flows into the cylinders) to better accommodate a restrictor we have to use per competition rules. The little 600cc engine only produces around 72 hp with the restrictor, compared to the 120 hp stock. Lots of fluid simulation work is done to validate that the changes are an improvement, and some of them are shown below. We are also creating a two level water jacket in the head, greatly increasing how much heat energy can be removed to the coolant, also pictured below.

With these changes, the engine is expected to get closer to the stock performance curves, and in some areas exceed them. Cooling will be much less of an issue, and will help keep the engine in use. Power outputs still may not be at the stock level, but will definitely be an improvement on what we have currently.

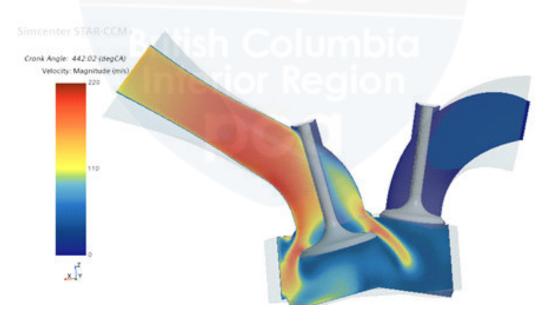


Figure 1: Air flowing through the stock intake ports at 10k RPM. Notice the jets around the valve, Ideally the jet on one side is much stronger than the other but this is also good. Credit: Simon Wen 2025

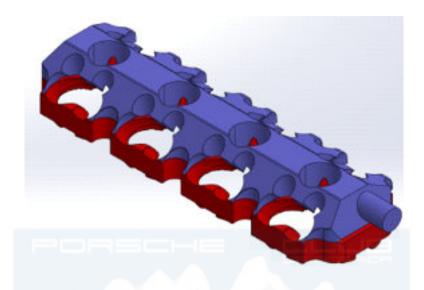


Figure 2: The two layer water jacket in the head. Red is the bottom layer, blue is the top Note the voids for the spark plug wells and the ports themselves. Credit: Simon Wen 2025

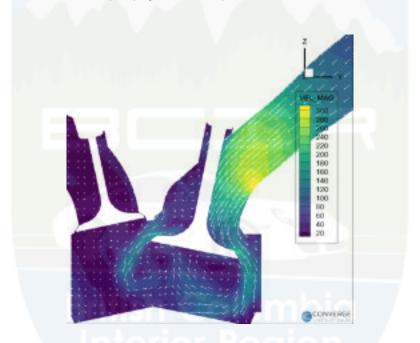


Figure 3: Airflow through the updated intake port at 10k RPM.

IS THAT A REAL PORSCHE 356?

That's the first question I usually get when people see my new car. The answer is no it's a replica - an Intermeccanica Convertible D." The follow-up question to that is usually something like "why would you drive a fake Porsche, isn't that like wearing a fake Rolex?" And my answer to that is, "no it's actually better than the real thing!" But before you roll your eyes and turn the page, let me explain why...

Porsche introduced the 356 in the 1950's and the convertible version, the Speedster, was built in relatively low numbers. By today's standards the specs of those cars look rather weak: 55-70hp, drum brakes, sloppy handling, 0-60 in well over 13 seconds etc. But they were beautiful cars and fun to drive! Lightweight and very communicative through the steering wheel. Today these cars are pretty rare, either rotted away with rust or restored to a tune of hundreds of thousands of dollars. Usually sitting in museums or collecting dust as part of collections and only driven sparingly just a few km's on weekends to Cars and Coffee events. But what if you could own this visually stunning car, drive it worry free and still keep up with modern sports cars on today's roads? Well you can - enter the replica.

Most Speedster replicas (also known as recreations) are built on modified vintage VW Beetle chassis and use the engine and drivetrain from these as well. Rather fitting after all as the Beetle was designed by Ferdinand Porsche and the 356 was essentially evolved from these cars, just beefier and more sporty. There have been dozens, maybe hundreds of replica kits and builders making these. Almost always with a fiberglass body, dropped on a shortened VW Beetle pan and powered by an air-cooled 4 cylinder VW boxer engine or Subaru water cooled boxer engine. Some look great and drive great, others not so much. Today there are a couple of respected replica builders making high quality Speedsters. In fact next time you drop by August Motors in Kelowna, check out the ones they sell. Really nice replicas built by Vintage Motorcars in California. Essentially a brand new car. I almost bought one of these stunning cars from August Motors but decided to hold out for the holy grail of replicas - the Intermeccanica.

So what's so special about Intermeccanica? Well for starters, they are an automobile builder founded in Italy in the 60's that produced many unique models. In the 70's they moved to California where they started building Porsche replica Speedsters and finally moved all production to Canada (Vancouver) in the 80's. Over these years they became renowned for their extremely high quality car builds. They evolved their Porsche replicas to be based on a custom designed tube chassis (like a race car) with custom suspensions. My car was built with a 2110cc motor from the California company CB Performance (by the famous builder Pat Downs) - a masterpiece engine with aluminum case, forged internals, dual Weber carbs, big oil sump, external oil radiator etc. It makes about 150hp and pushes the car, which only weighs about 1800lbs, way harder than an original Porsche 356 ever could. It also has a much more sophisticated suspension with thick torsion bars, sway bars and Porsche disk brakes all around. The wheels are custom built, much wider than original, allowing for beefier tires to enhance grip and handling. The interior, paint, convertible top and general fit and finish are world class, hand built in small volumes allowing for better attention to detail than the Porsche production line in the 50's could. It's fast and handles great. The model I have is actually based on a one year only 1959 Porsche model called the Convertible D. It has the body of the earlier Speedster but with a slightly higher windshield and proper roll-up windows (Speedsters have removable side curtains and a simple top), so it's also slightly more practical than a lot of the other Speedster replicas.

I know many Porsche purists may cringe when they see a replica adorned with Porsche badges and emblems. My car has a few, but also plenty of Intermeccanica branding. I think it's fitting that a car built as a tribute wears these, similar to how a million dollar Singer build pays homage to the 911, even though it shares few parts with an actual Porsche. A Singer Porsche may look like a 911 but it improves on it in almost every way.

That's how I see my replica 356, it has the beautiful shape of the original but more fun and practical to drive. If you disagree, grab me at the next PCA event and we can have a friendly debate over a coffee or beer! I think 3

if you see my car in person you'll likely be swayed.

P.S. So what's with that red Pegasus decal I see on the fenders of many 356's, including mine? It was the logo of the Pegasus Oil company which eventually became Mobil Oil. They sponsored road racing in the 50's and James Dean had the Pegasus on his Speedster. And other than Steve McQueen, he was probably the coolest Porsche owner ever. So I put the Pegasus on my car thinking maybe one day it'll make me as cool as James Dean! Actually there is also a practical reason I put it on my car... ask me about it when we have that beer.
